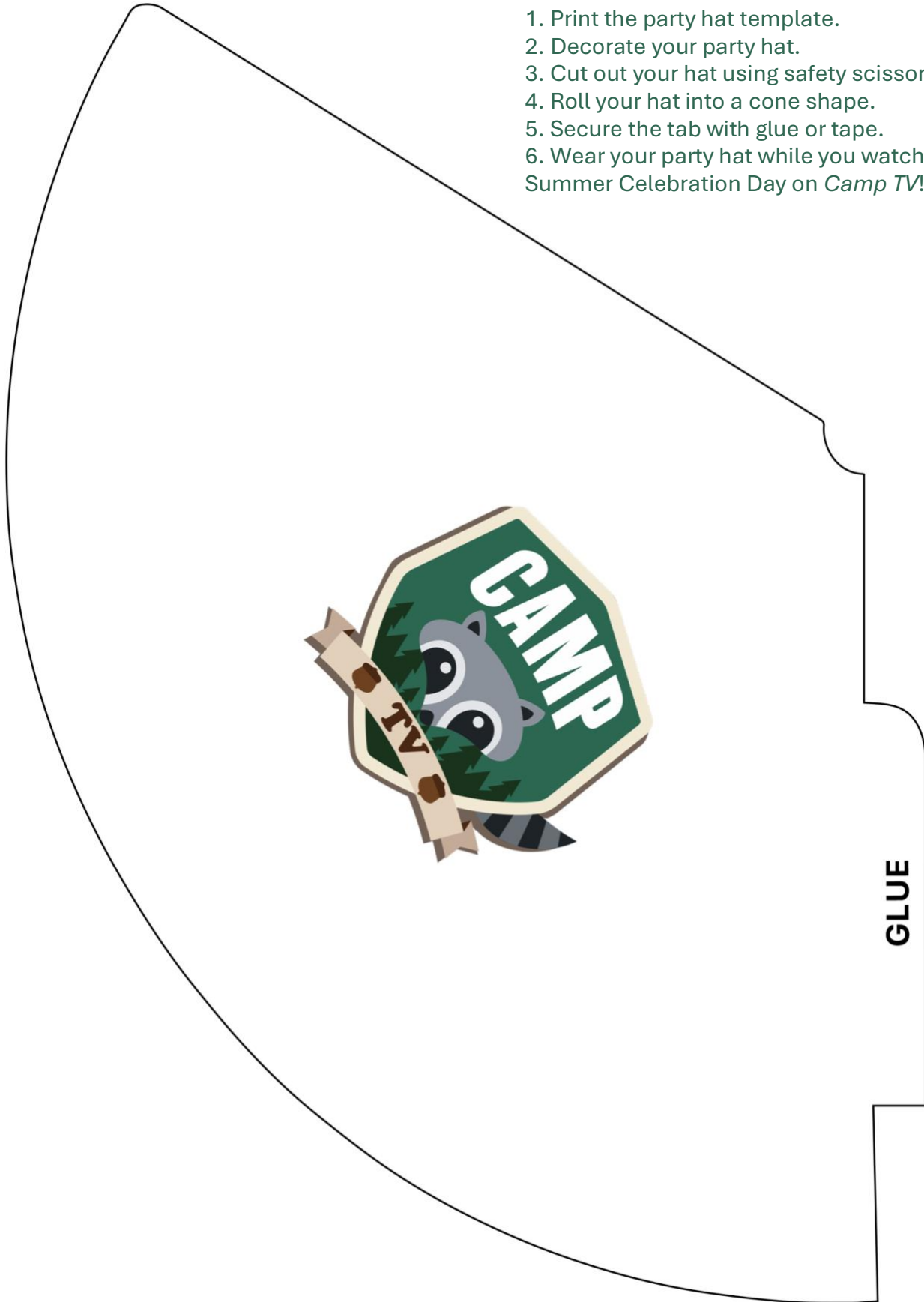

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Summer Celebration Day Party Hat

1. Print the party hat template.
2. Decorate your party hat.
3. Cut out your hat using safety scissors.
4. Roll your hat into a cone shape.
5. Secure the tab with glue or tape.
6. Wear your party hat while you watch Summer Celebration Day on *Camp TV!*





Noisemakers

Materials List:

- toilet paper or paper towel roll
- wax paper
- safety scissors
- rubber band
- items to decorate with – markers, paint, stickers etc.

Instructions:

1. Start by coloring your paper roll.



2. Cut out a wax paper circle that's big enough to wrap around one end of the roll.



3. Secure the wax paper to the end of the roll with the rubber band.



4. With the help of an adult, carefully make a hole in the middle of the roll.



5. Make some noise!

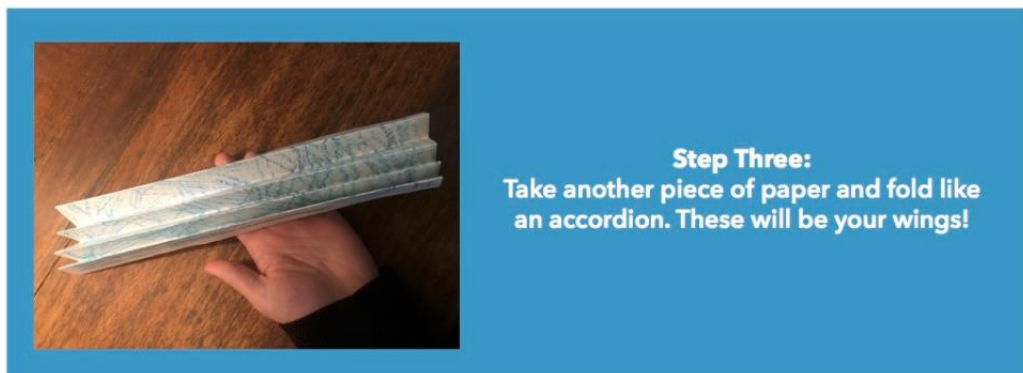




Puppetry – Make a Bird Puppet

Materials List:

- paper
- crayons/markers
- safety scissors
- tape
- stick, wooden dowel, or rod





Step Four:
Cut a quarter-sized slit towards the front of your bird's back and slip in your folded wings.



Step Five:
Attach the control rod and then tape the folded edges of the belly together.



Step Six:
Have some fun moving your bird puppet around!

Painting with Ice

Materials List:

- towel, newspaper, or something that can get messy
- water
- red, yellow, green, and blue food coloring
- ice cube tray
- popsicle sticks

Instructions:

1. Put down a towel, some old newspaper, or something an adult says is ok to get messy.



2. Carefully pour your water into the ice cube trays, leaving a little bit of space towards the top. Do your best to divide the water up evenly.



3. Add a tiny drop of food coloring to each cube.



4. Mix well and place a popsicle stick into each ice cube mold. Put it in the freezer until it's frozen (could take up to 4-6 hours).





Create a Flip Book

Materials List:

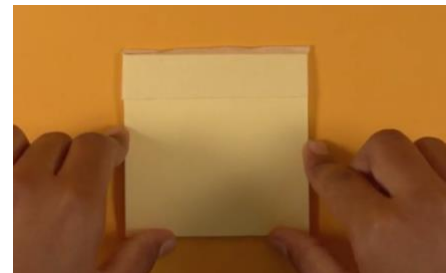
- sticky pad
- tape
- pen or pencil

Instructions:

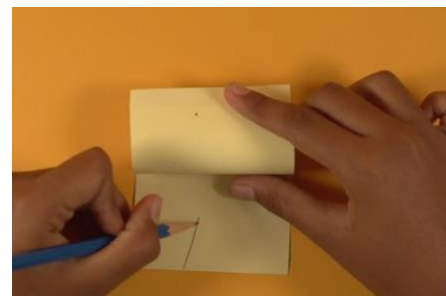
1. Start with a blank stack of sticky notes. You might want to split one notepad into thirds, so you end up with three smaller stacks to make more than one flip book.









2. Wrap tape around the sticky end of one of the stacks to prevent it from breaking apart when you draw in it.



3. Start on the last sticky note and draw a picture on the bottom half of the page. If your drawing is too close to the top, where the notes stick together, you might not see it when you flip the flip book at the end.



<p>4. Flip to the next sticky note (the second-to-last one in the stack) and see how your first drawing shows through the paper.</p>	
<p>5. Trace the still parts of the picture, the ones you don't want to move in the animation.</p>	
<p>6. Change the parts of your drawing that you do want to animate, or move.</p>	
<p>7. Flip to the next page. Repeat tracing the still parts and changing the parts that you are animating.</p>	
<p>8. As you fill the notepad from back to front, animate the movements little by little, page by page. You can flip your notepad (from back to front) to check your progress and see if you want to make changes.</p>	
<p>9. Once you finish your series of drawings or fill the entire notepad, use your thumb to flip the pages from back to front to watch your animation.</p>
